The Revitalization Day Meeting is June 4th

Revitalization Day for Arkansas State Organization is June 4 at Pulaski Tech in North Little Rock. All members may attend this day of guided thinking about and discussion of the future of ASO DKG. Every chapter and every state committee representation is important.

When a state has lost a significant number of members—25% or more in five years, the state organization is in danger of dissolving within another few years. ASO has 39 chapters; the Society website shows the current ASO membership is 952. The accompanying membership graph shows the steady decline in the number of ASO members and chapters.

From Downtown Little Rock:

Cross the Broadway Bridge northbound into North Little Rock. Turn west (left) onto West Broadway Avenue and continue until road ends at Pike Avenue. Veer right onto Pike Avenue. Continue north on Pike Avenue to the intersection with Pershing Blvd. Turn left (west) on Pershing. Drive 1 mile. The campus entrance will be at the top of the hill on your right.

From Interstate 40: Westbound:

Drive west on I-40. Take Exit 152-B (MacArthur Drive/Pike Avenue). At the end of the ramp, turn right onto Pike Avenue. Continue on Pike Avenue to the first stoplight. Turn right (west) onto Pershing Boulevard. Drive 1 mile. The campus entrance will be at the top of the hill on your right.

Eastbound:

Drive east on I-40. Take Exit 152 (Pike Avenue). Veer right off the ramp onto Pike Avenue. At the intersection of Pike Avenue and Pershing Boulevard, turn right (west) onto Pershing. Drive 1 mile. The campus entrance will be at the top of the hill on your right.

The Girl from Little Rock Comes Home

The Girl from Little Rock is a sculpture that was displayed at DKG Society Headquarters for several decades. Society Headquarters sold and was vacated this spring, and the Society staff was relocated to an office building in Austin.

While Society historical records were preserved and archived at an Austin library/research center, furniture and furnishings were sold. The graceful bronze statue was one of the many items placed in an auction.

ASO member Carolyn Pittman knew of the impending sale and successfully arranged for someone in Austin to attend the auction to bid for the purchase of *The Girl from Little Rock*. When Pittman attended an onsite board meeting of the DKG International Educational Foundation in March, she brought the statue to Arkansas.

Our Heritage III includes a picture of the piece and this information about how it came to be at Society Headquarters: "*The Girl from Little Rock*, The first Women in Art exhibit Purchase Award at the 1978 International Convention was awarded to Teus van den Berg, a member from the Netherlands, for her bronze sculpture. The inspiration for this piece came from a newspaper article and picture, of a small black girl on her first day in an integrated school, in Little Rock, Arkansas."

Teresa worked hard and earned grants and sought funding to buy hand chimes along with enough gloves for every student in her program. The result was an amazing program of students learning to use the chimes and making music! The songs were adjusted for every age and ability level in Teresa's classes. As a conclusion to her presentation she even had the DKG members in the session playing the chimes.

The keynote speaker for the day was MaryAnne Williams. MaryAnne shared her journey with Dolly Parton's Imagination Library in Arkansas. It was MaryAnne's goal to get the program to children in all the counties in Arkansas. That goal has been accomplished!

Lunch followed this inspiring presentation. After some announcements from ASO President Sue Cook and others the business meeting was convened. Area 3 Leader Ilyse Howard was re-elected and will serve another 2-year term. ASO Webmaster and Registrar Paula Williams was elected to a 2-year term on the Nominations Committee. Jane Jamison was elected to serve on the Personnel Committee. Business was concluded with a vote to donate the remaining money from registration fees to the Ella Reese Leadership Development Committee.

Following the official business some additional questions and answers about upcoming events were shared. Next on the agenda three lucky members won door prizes. After this final bit of fun the meeting was adjourned.

Past Kappa State President Wanda Roe, Gamma Eta, Receives Proclamation

Even though March 24th dawned gloomy and overcast outside, inside it was full of celebration. Baxter County Judge Mickey Pendergrass presented Wanda Roe with a proclamation in recognition of her many contributions to the Baxter County Historical Society. This day also marked the 149th anniversary of Baxter County

Wanda grew up in the small north Arkansas town of Norfolk. Her father ran the local theater and entertained the community with his renowned fiddle playing. Many of her family's heirlooms are now housed in the Historical Society's Museum in Mountain Home.

Following a luncheon and ceremony, attendees traveled to the museum where they viewed displays and were regaled with Wanda's stories about her family. Even though there were some tears, Wanda had a wonderful visit with friends who came to celebrate with her.

Kappa State Past President Dr. Gayle White Recently Received the Distinguished Golden Rider Award from SAU.



Dr. Gayle White was a Kappa State President from 1979 to 1981.

Dr. Gayle White, Turner Professor of Management and SAU Distinguished Professor, taught for 43 years in the Rankin College of Business at Southern Arkansas University. SAU recently named Dr. White as the winner of one of five awards given to distinguished alumni. The awards dinner and presentation will be May 5, 2022.

Dr. White's leadership on the state and national levels included President of the National Council of Alpha Chi, 1987-1991 (National Council Member 1979-2005); State President of Kappa State Delta Kappa Gamma, 1979-1981 (served on two DKG International Committees); President of the Arkansas Deans' Association, 1984-1985; and President of the Arkansas College Teachers of Business and Economic, 1989.

Her major contributions to SAU included chairmanship of four major institutional studies. Additional contributions to students included sponsorship of Alpha Chi, national college honor scholarship society, for over 20 years and sponsorship of Sigma Beta Delta, (National Business Honor Society for 10 years).

Dr. White's research has been published in such journals as *Journal of Business & Economic Research*, and the *American Journal of Business Education*, as well as numerous other journals.

She received the SAU Faculty Excellence Award for Research in 2003. In addition, Dr. White was selected SAU Honor Professor, 1997-1998. Early in her career, she was selected by the Arkansas Business Education Association as the 1980 Arkansas Business Educator of the Year.

Dr. White is a past President of Alpha Beta Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma in Magnolia, Arkansas and President of the DKG Arkansas State Organization. She was a part of a dynamic team that made their dream of an Arkansas Leadership Seminar a reality on the University of Central Arkansas Campus on July 6th – 8th 1988.

Dr. White and her husband have one daughter and two grandchildren; they recently moved to North Carolina to be near them.

A Field Trip to Apple Seeds

Gamma Iota Chapter members were excited to finally meet in person at their regular meeting on Thursday, April 7. The chapter has been meeting through Zoom for the past two years.

Members held their meeting at Apple Seeds, a 15-year-old non-profit which sits on a portion of beautiful Gulley Park in Fayetteville. Chapter members were given a tour by one of the staff members and enjoyed a question-and-answer period that followed.

Sixty local schools, the year before COVID started, partnered with Apple Seeds to reach 10,000 students in person at the schools or through field trips. Children learned about growing, harvesting, preparing, and eating healthy vegetables. Take-home bags of vegetables with recipes were distributed so that the children could share with their families. Area farmers donated extra vegetables to assist with the lessons. Fifteen thousand students were also reached through Zoom during the pandemic years.

Many special events are available during the year to help support the mission of Apple Seeds, which is "Inspire healthy living through garden-based education". Our members came away thinking that other DKG chapters in our area and throughout the state need to learn about Apple Seeds as well, so they may share the information with their members.
